

THE VIRTUE OF HUMILITY

My brothers, after charity, I cannot think of a virtue more vital to growing in holiness than the virtue of humility. This is especially true for men. One of the biggest sins that men struggle with in this life is the sin of pride. In the words of Venerable Fulton Sheen, "Pride is an inordinate love of one's own excellence, either of body or mind, or the unlawful pleasure we derive from thinking we have no superiors. Pride being swollen egoism, it erects that human soul into the separate center of origin apart from God, exaggerates its own importance, and becomes a world in and for itself. All other sins are evil deeds, but pride insinuates itself even unto good works to destroy and slay them. For that reason, Sacred Scriptures says "Pride goeth before destruction" (Prov. 16:18)."

Take a moment to think back on how many times pride has kept you from surrendering to God? How many times has it led to damaged and broken relationships in your life? How many times has it been the cause of pain for your wife and kids? Pride is something that we have to overcome if we are ever going to become the men God created us to be. The greatest remedy for pride is humility. Humility is the quality by which a person considering his own defects has a lowly opinion of himself and willingly submits himself to God and to others for God's sake. Humility is truly adopting the motto that it's not about me. It's about understanding that "the last shall be first and the first shall be last" (Mt 20:16). It is about putting God and others before our own wants and desires.

At first glance, my brothers, it seems as if one would be crazy to choose the path of humility. It seems nuts to think that willingly denying your own wants and desires for those of others would be the path to true joy and happiness. That is exactly what it is, though. That is why the teachings and actions of Christ are viewed as being so radical. They contradict everything that seems to come natural to us. This is what Jesus meant by telling us to enter through the narrow gate, "For the gate is narrow and the way is hard, that leads to life, and those that find it are few" (Mt 7:14).

The road to holiness was never promised to be an easy one to travel. Ridding ourselves of pride is certainly a difficult path. The secret to it, though, is humility. Yes it is hard to be truly humble, but that is what makes the reward of achieving humility so great. It's about denying oneself, picking up your cross and following Him. So, my brothers, we will spend the next month doing just that. We will spend it putting God, our wives, our children, and others first. The hope is that making humility a priority this month will help you choose to make it one every month moving forward for the rest of your life. We will begin week one working on humility in our relationship with God. Let's work together on becoming part of "the few." I look forward to walking the narrow road of humility with each of you this month!

WEEK 1 REFLECTION:

HUMILITY AND GOD

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If we are going to take a look at our humility as it relates to God, there is no better place to start than with the words of St. John the Baptist, "He must increase and I must decrease" (Jn 3:30). That is the exact mindset that we must have in our relationship with the Father. We have to understand that there is a God and we are not Him. We need to receive the knowledge that everything that we are and everything we have is gift from God to be used for the purpose of serving Him—and that it is a gift we are not worthy of. John the Baptist knew that well. That's why he said, "I baptize with water: but among you stands one whom you do not know, even he who comes after me, the thong of his sandals I am not worthy to untie" (Jn 1:26-27). John the Baptist knew that his purpose was to serve God, not to be God. That's why he sent his own disciples after Christ. He was humble enough to step out of the way and let God work. Now it is time for us to do the same.

Humbling ourselves before God is a hard thing to do for most men. Our egos tell us that we don't need help from anybody or anything. Some of us were even raised to think it is weak or even pitiful to admit that you have to depend on anyone or anything but yourself. That's why so many men have to hit rock bottom before they will finally admit they need God. Our pride and our ego, more often than not, keep us from surrendering to God. In the words of St. Augustine, "It was pride that changed angels into devils; it is humility that makes men as angels." In order to break free from the pride that comes from our fallen nature, we must learn humility.

You may be thinking, "How do I learn how to humble myself before God?" I would tell you, "By looking at the Son of God." Jesus did everything His Father commanded. He took on flesh and was born into a feeding trough for animals. He was hated and taunted by people who didn't like Him. He was beaten, tortured, and eventually brutally killed by the very people that He came to save—all so He could say, "the world must know that I love the Father and that I do just as he commanded me" (Jn 14:31). Still today, Jesus is constantly humbling Himself. Each and everyday Jesus makes Himself small in the Eucharist so that He can be one with you. He becomes your very food so that your soul can be strengthened and nourished by Him. Why in the world would we not want to do the same for Him? Why would we not become small so that He could be glorified?

My brothers, this week is all about learning humility as it pertains to God. It's about stepping out of the way like St. John the Baptist and letting God have His say in your life. We cannot hope to ever achieve true humility in the other important relationships in our lives if we are not willing to humble ourselves before the Father. A good place to start is with the Son. Jesus tell us in Matthew 11:29, "Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart and you will find rest for yourselves." I don't know about you, but I think that's pretty good advice. If you are looking for a starting place, flip over to your Opportunities for Grace chart (at the beginning of this booklet) and you'll find four pretty good ways to humble yourself before the Lord. Humble yourself by going to confession, hit your knees in adoration or at daily Mass, put aside your busy schedule and meet the Lord in prayer. I'm pretty sure any man that has taken the time to do so hasn't regretted it. Neither will you. Good luck, my brothers. Know I am walking this journey with you and praying for each of you each day.

GOSPEL JN 13:1-15 HOLY THURSDAY EVENING MASS OF THE LORD'S SUPPER

Now before the feast of the Passover, when Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart out of this world to the Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. And during supper, when the devil had already put it into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray him, Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, rose from supper, laid aside his garments, and girded himself with a towel. Then he poured water into a basin, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel with which he was girded. He came to Simon Peter; and Peter said to him, "Lord, do you wash my feet?" Jesus answered him, "What I am doing you do not know now, but afterward you will understand." Peter said to him, "You shall never wash my feet." Jesus answered him, "If I do not wash you, you have no part in me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "He who has bathed does not need to wash, except for his feet, but he is clean all over; and you are clean, but not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; that was why he said, "You are not all clean."

When he had washed their feet, and taken his garments, and resumed his place, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord; and you are right, for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you.

GOSPEL JN 18:1—19:42 GOOD FRIDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION

When Jesus had spoken these words, he went forth with his disciples across the Kidron valley, where there was a garden, which he and his disciples entered. Now Judas, who betrayed him, also knew the place; for Jesus often met there with his disciples. So Judas, procuring a band of soldiers and some officers from the chief priests and the Pharisees, went there with lanterns and torches and weapons. Then Jesus, knowing all that was to befall him, came forward and said to them, "Whom do you seek?" They answered him, "Jesus of Nazareth." Jesus said to them, "I am he." Judas, who betrayed him, was standing with them. When he said to them, "I am he," they drew back and fell to the ground. Again he asked them, "Whom do you seek?" And they said, "Jesus of Nazareth." Jesus answered, "I told you that I am he; so, if you seek me, let these men go." This was to fulfil the word which he had spoken, "Of those whom thou gavest me I lost not one." Then Simon Peter, having a sword, drew it and struck the high priest's slave and cut off his right ear. The slave's name was Malchus. Jesus said to Peter, "Put your sword into its sheath; shall I not drink the cup which the Father has given me?"

So the band of soldiers and their captain and the officers of the Jews seized Jesus and bound him. First they led him to Annas; for he was the father-in-law of Ca'iaphas, who was high priest that year. It was Ca'iaphas who had given counsel to the Jews that it was expedient that one man should die for the people. Simon Peter followed Jesus, and so did another disciple. As this disciple was known to the high priest, he entered the court of the high priest along with Jesus, while Peter stood outside at the door. So the other disciple, who was known to the high priest, went out and spoke to the maid who kept the door, and brought Peter in. The maid who kept the door said to Peter, "Are not you also one of this man's disciples?" He said, "I am not." Now the servants and officers had made a charcoal fire, because it was cold, and they were standing and warming themselves; Peter also was with them, standing and warming himself.

The high priest then questioned Jesus about his disciples and his teaching. Jesus answered him, "I have spoken openly to the world; I have always taught in synagogues and in the temple, where all Jews come together; I have said nothing secretly. Why do you ask me? Ask those who have heard me, what I said to them; they know what I said." When he had said this, one of the officers standing by struck Jesus with his hand, saying, "Is that how you answer the high priest?" Jesus answered him, "If I have spoken wrongly, bear witness to the wrong; but if I have spoken rightly, why do you strike me?" Annas then sent him bound to Ca'iaphas the high priest.

Now Simon Peter was standing and warming himself. They said to him, "Are not you also one of his disciples?" He denied it and said, "I am not." One of the servants of the high priest, a kinsman of the man whose ear Peter had cut off, asked, "Did I not see you in the garden with him?" Peter again denied it; and at once the cock crowed.

Then they led Jesus from the house of Ca'iaphas to the praetorium. It was early. They themselves did not enter the praetorium, so that they might not be defiled, but might eat the passover. So Pilate went out to them and said, "What accusation do you bring against this man?" They answered him, "If this man were not an evildoer, we would not have handed him over." Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves and judge him by your own law." The Jews said to him, "It is not lawful for us to put any man to death." This was to fulfil the word which Jesus had spoken to show by what death he was to die.

Pilate entered the praetorium again and called Jesus, and said to him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus answered, "Do you say this of your own accord, or did others say it to you about me?" Pilate answered, "Am I a Jew? Your own nation and the chief priests have handed you over to me; what have you done?" Jesus answered, "My kingship is not of this world; if my kingship were of this world, my servants would fight, that I might not be handed over to the Jews; but my kingship is not from the world." Pilate said to him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I have come into the world, to bear witness to the truth. Every one who is of the truth hears my voice." Pilate said to him, "What is truth?"

After he had said this, he went out to the Jews again, and told them, "I find no crime in him. But you have a custom that I should release one man for you at the Passover;

will you have me release for you the King of the Jews?" They cried out again, "Not this man, but Barab'bas!" Now Barab'bas was a robber.

Then Pilate took Jesus and scourged him. And the soldiers plaited a crown of thorns, and put it on his head, and arrayed him in a purple robe; they came up to him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" and struck him with their hands. Pilate went out again, and said to them, "Behold, I am bringing him out to you, that you may know that I find no crime in him." So Jesus came out, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. Pilate said to them, "Here is the man!" When the chief priests and the officers saw him, they cried out, "Crucify him, crucify him!" Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves and crucify him, for I find no crime in him." The Jews answered him, "We have a law, and by that law he ought to die, because he has made himself the Son of God." When Pilate heard these words, he was the more afraid; he entered the praetorium again and said to Jesus, "Where are you from?" But Jesus gave no answer. Pilate therefore said to him, "You will not speak to me? Do you not know that I have power to release you, and power to crucify you?" Jesus answered him, "You would have no power over me unless it had been given you from above; therefore he who delivered me to you has the greater sin."

Upon this Pilate sought to release him, but the Jews cried out, "If you release this man, you are not Caesar's friend; every one who makes himself a king sets himself against Caesar." When Pilate heard these words, he brought Jesus out and sat down on the judgment seat at a place called The Pavement, and in Hebrew, Gab'batha. Now it was the day of Preparation of the Passover; it was about the sixth hour. He said to the Jews, "Here is your King!" They cried out, "Away with him, away with him, crucify him!" Pilate said to them, "Shall I crucify your King?" The chief priests answered, "We have no king but Caesar." Then he handed him over to them to be crucified.

So they took Jesus, and he went out, bearing his own cross, to the place called the place of a skull, which is called in Hebrew Gol'gotha. There they crucified him, and with him two others, one on either side, and Jesus between them. Pilate also wrote a title and put it on the cross; it read, "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews." Many of the Jews read this title, for the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city; and it was written in Hebrew, in Latin, and in Greek. The chief priests of the Jews then said to Pilate, "Do not write, 'The King of the Jews,' but, 'This man said, I am King of the Jews.''' Pilate answered, "What I have written I have written."

When the soldiers had crucified Jesus they took his garments and made four parts, one for each soldier; also his tunic. But the tunic was without seam, woven from top to bottom; so they said to one another, "Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it to see whose it shall be." This was to fulfil the scripture,

"They parted my garments among them, and for my clothing they cast lots." So the soldiers did this. But standing by the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Mag'dalene. When Jesus saw his mother, and the disciple whom he loved standing near, he said to his mother, "Woman, behold, your son!" Then he said to the disciple, "Behold, your mother!" And from that hour the disciple took her to his own home.

After this Jesus, knowing that all was now finished, said (to fulfil the scripture), "I thirst." A bowl full of vinegar stood there; so they put a sponge full of the vinegar on hyssop and held it to his mouth. When Jesus had received the vinegar, he said, "It is finished"; and he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.

Since it was the day of Preparation, in order to prevent the bodies from remaining on the cross on the sabbath (for that sabbath was a high day), the Jews asked Pilate that their legs might be broken, and that they might be taken away. So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first, and of the other who had been crucified with him; but when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs. But one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear, and at once there came out blood and water. He who saw it has borne witness—his testimony is true, and he knows that he tells the truth—that you also may believe. For these things took place that the scripture might be fulfilled, "Not a bone of him shall be broken." And again another scripture says, "They shall look on him whom they have pierced."

After this Joseph of Arimathe'a, who was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly, for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate that he might take away the body of Jesus, and Pilate gave him leave. So he came and took away his body. Nicode'mus also, who had at first come to him by night, came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about a hundred pounds' weight. They took the body of Jesus, and bound it in linen cloths with the spices, as is the burial custom of the Jews. Now in the place where he was crucified there was a garden, and in the garden a new tomb where no one had ever been laid. So because of the Jewish day of Preparation, as the tomb was close at hand, they laid Jesus there.

GOSPEL MARK 16:1-7 HOLY SATURDAY AT THE EASTER VIGIL IN THE HOLY NIGHT OF EASTER

And when the sabbath was past, Mary Mag'dalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salo'me, bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week they went to the tomb when the sun had risen. And they were saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the door of the tomb?" And looking up, they saw that the stone was rolled back; for it was very large. And entering the tomb, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, dressed in a white robe; and they were amazed. T SAY THE LITANY OF HUMILITY PRAYER

GOSPEL JN 20:1-9 EASTER SUNDAY THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD

Now on the first day of the week Mary Mag'dalene came to the tomb early, while it was still dark, and saw that the stone had been taken away from the tomb. So she ran, and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Peter then came out with the other disciple, and they went toward the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first; and stooping to look in, he saw the linen cloths lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb; he saw the linen cloths lying, and the napkin, which had been on his head, not lying with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not know the scripture, that he must rise from the dead.

So Mary Mag'dalene and the other Mary departed quickly from the tomb with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. And behold, Jesus met them and said, "Hail!" And they came up and took hold of his feet and worshiped him. Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid; go and tell my brethren to go to Galilee, and there they will see me."

While they were going, behold, some of the guard went into the city and told the chief priests all that had taken place. And when they had assembled with the elders and taken counsel, they gave a sum of money to the soldiers and said, "Tell people, 'His disciples came by night and stole him away while we were asleep.' And if this comes to the governor's ears, we will satisfy him and keep you out of trouble." So they took the money and did as they were directed; and this story has been spread among the Jews to this day.

T SAY THE LITANY OF HUMILITY PRAYER



But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb, and as she wept she stooped to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had lain, one at the head and one at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "Because they have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." Saying this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom do you seek?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rab-bo'ni!" (which means Teacher). SAY THE LITANY OF HUMILITY PRAYER



That very day two of them were going to a village named Emma'us, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, "What is this conversation which you are holding with each other as you walk?" And they stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, named Cle'opas, answered him, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since this happened. Moreover, some women of our company amazed us. They were at the tomb early in the morning and did not find his body; and they came back saying that they had even seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb, and found it just as the women had said; but him they did not see." And he said to them, "O foolish men, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" And beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them in all the scriptures the things concerning himself.

So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He appeared to be going further, but they constrained him, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." So he went in to stay with them. When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed, and broke it, and gave it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognized him; and he vanished out of their sight. They said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the scriptures?" And they rose that same hour and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven gathered together and those who were with them, who said, "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he was known to them in the breaking of the bread.

WEEK 2 REFLECTION:

HUMILITY AND MY WIFE

*If you are not married and do not have children, use this week to continue to grow your relationship with God and your neighbor while praying for your future spouse and children.

Humility in my marriage. Hmmm. Many of us may be cringing trying to think of how many times it has been missing. Chances are, our pride might have even raised its ugly head in our marriage this very day. It is a common occurrence in a lot of marriages and we can be quite certain that it helps lead to many divorces. That is why it is so crucial to learn how to practice humility in our relationship with our wives.

Marriage is supposed to be the coming together of two to become one. In fact, Genesis 2:24 tell us, "That is why a man leaves his father and mother and clings to his wife, and the two of them become one flesh." Without humility this cannot happen. You see, for the two to become one, there has to be sacrifice. There has to be a desire to will the good of the other. There has to be an effort to put the needs of the other first. There must be a laying down of one's pride. St. Paul echos this in Philippians 2:5 when he writes, "Do nothing out of selfishness or out of vainglory; rather, humbly regard others as more important than yourselves." This is one of the most important keys to having a successful marriage.

The problem is most of us don't listen to the words of Scripture. Most of us have been influenced by the lies of the world. Whether we know it or not, we have bought into the idea that we need power, independence, and control. We think that we need to be taken care of first before others. We have been convinced it is all about us. This has no place in our marriages. When we have that mindset we forget how to say things like, "I was wrong." We forget how to tell the one we love the most, "I'm sorry." These are some of the easiest words to pronounce but are the hardest words to say when we are swallowed up by our pride.

The country music singer Travis Tritt has a song entitled "Foolish Pride" that deals with this very thing. It tells of a husband and wife that have had some sort of a fight and even though both long to reconcile with the other, their foolish pride keeps them from acting. Their relationship, as the song says, "goes down" to foolish pride.

The good thing is we have so many ways in which to practice humility in our marriages. We can start to take ownership of our mistakes. We can be the first to say "I am sorry" or "I was wrong." We can choose to sidestep the paths we have been down so many times in conversations that in the past have led to arguments. We can take constructive criticism as just that. We can be okay with not getting to pick the place we eat or choose the show we watch. We can be the one to take the initiative to help the kids with homework or get them to sports practice when both parents have work that needs to be done. We can choose to serve instead of being served.

Humility is what will strengthen our marriages and help us truly put our wives first. It keeps us grounded and, in the words of St. Teresa of Calcutta, "It is in being humble that our love becomes real, devoted and ardent. If you are humble nothing will touch you, neither praise nor disgrace, because you know what you are. If you are blamed you will not be discouraged. If they call you a saint you will not put yourself on a pedestal."

So my brothers, let's put in the work, squash our pride, and become the humble husbands our wives deserve.

After this Jesus revealed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tibe'ri-as; and he revealed himself in this way. Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathan'a-el of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zeb'edee, and two others of his disciples were together. Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat; but that night they caught nothing.

Just as day was breaking, Jesus stood on the beach; yet the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, have you any fish?" They answered him, "No." He said to them, "Cast the net on the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in, for the quantity of fish. That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on his clothes, for he was stripped for work, and sprang into the sea. But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, but about a hundred yards off.

When they got out on land, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish lying on it, and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred and fifty-three of them; and although there were so many, the net was not torn. WEEK 3 REFLECTION:

HUMILITY AND My Children

*If you are not married and do not have children, use this week to continue to grow your relationship with God and your neighbor while praying for your future spouse and children.

If there is one thing I want my children to be, it is humble. I want them to appreciate the things they have in life. I want them to know how to treat others. I long for them to put others first. I dream of them scoring the winning touchdown, coming in first in the spelling bee, or hitting the game-winning shot and handling it with class, deflecting all praise and recognizing the others it took to make it there. I want them to humble themselves before God and always make sure that He is the priority in their lives. Who wouldn't want their children to turn out that way? How can we ensure that they do?

The answer to that question is simple: we need to be humble, ourselves. If you have been a father for five minutes you know that those little (or big, depending on the age of your kids) eyes are watching you at all times. We have all dropped a four letter word in the car after being cutoff in traffic, just to look in that rear mirror and see the wide eyed look of our kids. Most of us have probably overreacted in an argument with our wife and seen our children taking in every bit of our behavior.

Just the other night my family and I were participating in a healing holy hour in front of the Blessed Sacrament. After a few moments of silent prayer I opened my eyes and noticed my daughter, Katelyn, mimicking everything I was doing. If I placed my palms up on my legs, she followed suit. If I moved my hands together in a prayer formation, she did as well. It was a huge moment of revelation for me. Our kids are always watching, learning from us. What they learn is up to us. If we want our kids to be humble, then we have to model humility to them. We do this by living what we preach and quickly admitting it in the times that we don't.

Kids are smart. Eventually they realize that words are just words. When they see you correct yourself for that four letter word you let out in traffic, they will remember it. When they see you tell your wife you are sorry for the way you might have behaved in an argument, it makes an impression. Visibly putting our pride aside and modeling what humility looks like will have a profound and lasting impact on our children.

Children latch on to mom, but they long to be like daddy. If you want them to live humbly, start by doing so yourself. This includes modeling humility to the them as it pertains to God. Fathers represent God in the eyes of their kids. Many children will project their feelings about their father onto their Heavenly Father. What better way to teach kids humility than by showing them that their dad has someone he answers to as well? What better image to give your children, no matter their age, than the image of their father on his knees in prayer or leading his family in the Rosary? The most humble man to ever live gave glory to His Father at every opportunity. We should be no different.

Men, spend time this week looking for opportunities to model humility to your children. We need to raise up a generation of children willing to meet the pride of the world with humility. It all starts with you. It doesn't matter how young or how old they are. They will always look to you as an example. Humble yourself before them this week and watch the ripples flow.

WEEK 4 REFLECTION:

HUMILITY AND My Neighbor

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Learning to live out the virtue of humility with your neighbor can be the hardest to practice. Let's face it, no matter how challenging it can be to humble yourself with your wife and kids, they are still people you have chosen to love. It is easier to practice humility with those you hold dear. That's the thing though: Christ commanded us to love everyone. That means we have to practice humility in all our relationships. Even those we find the most difficult.

Look around the world today or scroll through social media and you will see that there is a massive lack of humility. People are at odds with each other and working as hard as they can to prove how wrong someone else's opinion is. Folks are jumping at the opportunity to take a self-righteous position over another, and will go to great lengths to cancel or destroy another human being for disagreeing with them. Pride has infused itself into many facets of the world and it is very easy to get sucked into it all if you're not careful. All of us have had the inclination to fight back when we have been attacked. We want to fire back at the smug guy in the office who never stops talking about himself and all his achievements. I am pretty sure we have all felt that desire to catch up to the person in traffic who cut us off and give them a piece of our mind. But that is not what are called to as disciples of Christ. No, we are told to turn the other cheek. We are told to forgive and love our enemies. Jesus instructs us to take the high road and the narrow path. He doesn't just tell us to do it, though. He shows us how by His actions.

Jesus never lashed out or tried to strike back when men slapped Him, spit on Him, tore His beard from His face, or beat Him. He never wished harm to the Pharisees who constantly mocked Him and plotted against Him. No, instead Jesus spent His time with sinners and others that society had cast aside. On the night before His death, the Son of God spent time washing the feet of His disciples. He taught us that the last shall be first and the first shall be last. He told us, "those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted." The One who deserved to be served more than anyone instead came to show us how to serve. These are the lessons that we must learn if we are going to live like Jesus and truly become His disciples. We cannot grow any further in the spiritual life without understanding and adopting humility.

My brothers, now is the time to examine our lives. Are we living a meek and humble life, modeled after Christ, or are we living with pride and arrogance like the pharisees? Are we laying down our pride and choosing to humbly serve others? Do we take the time to listen and appreciate the circumstances of our neighbors' lives, or are we choosing to care only about what affects us? These are just some of the questions we need to ask ourselves this week.

As I wrote at the beginning of this reflection, humility with others outside of our families and our close circles is where the rubber meets the road. Christ has called us to care for and to serve others the way that He did. Remember that Christ is in every person you encounter—even the ones you may find difficult. Never forget that our Lord said, "Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me" (Mt 25:40).

To him the gatekeeper opens; the sheep hear his voice, and he calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes before them, and the sheep follow him, for they know his voice. A stranger they will not follow, but they will flee from him, for they do not know the voice of strangers." This figure Jesus used with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So Jesus again said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, I am the door of the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and robbers; but the sheep did not heed them. I am the door; if any one enters by me, he will be saved, and will go in and out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.
