

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THE VIRTUE OF GENEROSITY

My brothers, last month we focused on gratitude. We worked on being grateful for everything in life—the good and the bad. It is from that learned virtue of gratitude that we find ourselves inspired to be generous. Generosity is a natural result of living a grateful life. When we truly appreciate the gifts we have been given from God, we feel an overwhelming sense of joy and a desire to give back. We find ourselves longing to pass on what we have received. We turn from being self-centered and selfish men to men with a giving heart and a very real sense of selflessness. The virtue of generosity is crucial to living the life of a disciple, and it is absolutely necessary when living a life of service to others, which we are called to do.

St. John Paul II said, "The measure of your success will be the measure of your generosity." He was restating the words of Our Lord from Luke 6:38, where Jesus said, "Give and it will be given to you; good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap. For the measure you give will be the measure you get back." This is one of the most crucial lessons we must learn as a follower of Christ. We will not be judged on all our worldly accomplishments and the material things we have amassed. We will be judged on what we gave away. Our time, our talent, our treasure. These are things that are not meant for storing up, but for sharing with others. This is what Jesus meant when He asked the question, "What profit is there for one to gain the whole world and forfeit his life?" (Mark 8:36). Think of all the gifts God has given you. These are meant not only for you but, first and foremost, are meant for others, too.

When we live our lives with consideration for only ourselves and our own needs we miss the point of life. That's why you can look around and quickly see how many unhappy people there are in the world. It is because they have bought into the lie that if you put yourself first and always seek to meet your own needs you will be happy. It is the very reason you see so many with so much, but in truth they have so little. True joy and true fulfillment come from passing on what we have been so graciously given. Just think about the times you have rolled down your window to give food or money to someone in need. Think about the times you have been led to share your faith with someone who is struggling to get through life. Recall how you felt when you used a special skill or ability to help a friend, family member, or your parish with a specific need. Look back on the times you stopped to give someone a moment of your time when you didn't really have the time to give—but you did it anyway. I'll bet that looking back on each of those moments triggers feelings of joy and contentment; the kind of joy and contentment that only comes from giving of yourself to others.

My brothers, that's what true joy is all about. It's the reward of living the life Christ has called us to live. The fact is, when we are living in a constant state of giving, we realize we receive so much more. That's what is so crazy about putting others first. When you finally figure it out, you realize that by being generous, you actually receive more than you ever gave.

This month, let us pray for each other that we can fight the urge to be selfish with our time, talent, and treasure. Let's look for opportunities each day to bless others with what we have been given. I promise you, brothers, you won't regret it.

WEEK 1 REFLECTION:

GENEROSITY AND GOD

God is so generous. Stop and think about that for a minute. Think of how much God has truly given to you. First and foremost, He gave up the one thing He loved the most for you: His Son, Jesus. Imagine doing that—giving one of your children up to save someone who didn't deserve it. It really is hard to fathom.

Look around at all the other signs that show how the Lord has been generous to you. Your health, your family, your friends, your freedom, your home, your job, and so much more. The Lord continually showers blessings upon us. Even in the times when it doesn't seem like it, He is constantly bestowing gifts upon us. Our job as loving sons is to receive these gifts from our generous Father and to do our very best to give them all back in to Him in some form or fashion.

Often times, when we think about being generous towards God, our minds go right to tithing. This is probably the most common way people give back to God. Tithing has biblical roots, and it's also one of the quicker and easier ways of giving back to God. If you think about it, it really isn't a bad deal. God gave you all the money you have and you get to keep 90 percent of it all. Why, then, is it so hard to give that 10 percent? For some, it may be that we don't have it to give. It might be that we have had hard times and we can't give at the moment.

For a long time in my life, I struggled to tithe because I was selfish and saw it as my money and not His. Therefore I found it hard to give back to Him because "I earned it." That's why money can be such a huge problem for some people. We freely receive it from God, but we don't want to freely give it back. We have to start looking at the money we have as God's money. This will help you see that you are merely giving back some of what He gave to you.

Two of the other ways you can begin to practice generosity is with your time and your talents. More than anything, God wants your time. He wants your attention. God wishes to grow in relationship with you. The only way that happens is with you being generous with your time. We have to be willing to sacrifice other things so that we can can give more of our time to growing in relationship with our Father. That is why the Opportunities for Grace Chart is so powerful. There are multiple ways listed there to give more of your time to God. The crazy thing is, the more you give, the more He gives. He continues to bless you even in your attempts to repay previous blessings!

All of us have specific gifts that God blessed us with when we were created. We all have different talents and things we are good at. Those gifts were given to us for a reason and that reason is to grow the kingdom. When we use our talents in conjunction with our time, we can really give back to God in some amazing ways. Some choose to use those talents by teaching RCIA or PRE in their parish. Some people use their gifts of leadership to run small groups or organize groups to work in the soup kitchen. In my life, I try to use my gifts to bring people to Jesus through the podcast, speaking engagements, and the materials we provide through Pew Ministries.

We all have different gifts. All we have to do is figure out what they are and be willing to give our time to use them for serving God. My brothers, this week, let's give our time to the Lord so we can grow in relationship with Him and He can show us how to use our gifts to best serve Him.

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WEEK 2 REFLECTION:

GENEROSITY AND MY WIFE

^{*}If you are not married and do not have children, use this week to continue to grow your relationship with God and your neighbor while praying for your future spouse and children.

My brothers, the virtue of generosity plays a significant role in every successful marriage. I was reading a study by the University of Virginia the other day that proved this fact. The study was conducted in 2011 and found that couples who reported a high amount of generosity in their marriages "were at least 32 percentage points more likely to report that they are very happy in their marriage" than marriages with lower levels of generosity. It makes sense, doesn't it? When we are living out of a place of sacrificial love, we are more joyful. To be generous means to give freely and abundantly without counting the cost. It means to give without looking to receive. That last line can be the tricky part though, right fellas? Often times, when it comes to our wives, we give, but there is a catch that goes along with it.

I mean, if we are being honest, sometimes we give because we are looking to receive. Maybe we cleaned the house because we want a night out with the boys. Maybe we picked up other chores our wives usually handle because we want them to go to bed with us. If we aren't careful, we can get into a habit of doing nice things for our wives strictly because we want something in return. That is not true generosity. No, that is looking out for ourselves and it leads us back to the selfishness we are all trying so hard to avoid. If we are falling prey to this false sense of generosity, then we need to nip it in the bud as soon as possible and learn to practice true, no-strings-attached generosity with our wives.

So, how do we do that? Well, there are several ways. Most of us usually go the easy route. We grab some flowers or we buy some gifts we hope they love. Those are nice things, but I think we can be generous in more profound, life-giving ways. For instance, we can be generous with our words. Here's what I mean: we should spend a lot of time affirming our wives. We should compliment them on the things they are good at and let them know how special they are to us. On the days where they are weighed down with being a mom, a spouse, an employee—not to mention the the kids' chauffeur—we should let them know how amazing they are. When they are feeling self-doubt or stress over not being enough, we should be generous with our words and lift them up. We were created to be the protectors of our family, and often times that means protecting our wives from the lies the devil tells them about themselves. This is where being generous in our words can really make a difference in the lives of our spouses.

There are other ways of showing our generosity, as well. We can practice random acts of love; doing things that we don't normally do. Here are few examples: picking up the groceries, taking care of the kids needs, or offering to give our wives a night off to do whatever it is her heart desires. Sometimes that is what our wives need more than anything—time to breathe, time to step off the crazy merry-go-round of parenting, juggling work, and seeing to everyone else's needs. Sometimes, giving of your time is the most generous gift you can give your spouse.

Another suggestion is to be generous with your affection. I am not just talking about sex here, fellas. I am talking about simple signs of our affection for our wives. When is the last time you held your wife's hand while walking through a store, watching a movie, or simply sitting together? When is the last time you walked up and gave her a warm, lingering hug? There have been times in my marriage where I have gone days, even weeks without doing so. Don't let a lack of affection toward your wife become

a habit, guys. Our wives want to feel intimacy with us outside of the bedroom. If we are not taking time to be generous in this way, we are doing a real disservice to our marriage.

One last thing, my brothers: don't forget to be generous with your humility and with your gratitude. We spent time the last two months on those virtues and they can be practiced here as a part of generosity. Be generous with your apologies. Be generous with saying you're sorry. Sometimes that is the best gift we can give someone we have hurt. Don't ever forget the power of admitting you were wrong and asking for forgiveness. Use the words "thank you" early and often. Many times those are the words that escape us, but our wives long to hear those words from us and from our children.

Our wives are more deserving of our generosity than anyone else in our lives. They endlessly give without ever asking to receive. It is not as easy for us men. We have to work at it and we have to learn to be intentional about it. So that's what we are going to do this week. Gentlemen, be generous in your words, with your time, and in your actions with your wife this week. Let her know that you see her. Let her know you see every beautiful, generous, life giving thing about her. Let's give back to the one who has given us so much. Good luck fellas, and know that I am walking alongside you in practicing generosity with our spouses this week.

LK 2:41-51 MEMORIAL OF THE IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY

Now his parents went to Jerusalem every year at the feast of the Passover. And when he was twelve years old, they went up according to custom; and when the feast was ended, as they were returning, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem. His parents did not know it, but supposing him to be in the company they went a day's journey, and they sought him among their kinsfolk and acquaintances; and when they did not find him, they returned to Jerusalem, seeking him. We have such a tremendous opportunity to be generous as fathers. If you have young children at home now, you know your kids want nothing more than your time and your attention. When they are young, they see you as their hero and any time you turn your gaze on them it excites them. To have time with Daddy is a special thing for little boys and girls. We must never forget that. We need to be generous with our time and with our words when it come to our kids.

As a young boy I can remember my dad teaching me the sport he loved: basketball. I can remember him setting the goal in concrete in the backyard. I can remember him teaching me to dribble. I can remember him teaching me to pass and the correct way to shoot the ball. Those are some of my favorite memories. The only thing I wish is that I had more of them.

My dad worked a lot to provide for us. He didn't miss games or anything like that, but he was always busy. He worked two jobs. When he wasn't at work, he was busy around the house trying to take care of everything that he couldn't do when he was working. were so many days that I wanted him to put away the lawn mower, to put down the mulch bags, and play ball with me. I dreamed of afternoons of shooting ball with my dad and hearing him tell me how proud he was of me. I wanted him to tell me he noticed how much I was practicing and how much it showed. More often than not that didn't happen. Don't get me wrong, my dad was a great father; I just wanted more. I wanted to feel more important than work. I wanted him to tell me how he felt about me. It was hard for him because of the way he was raised and, because of that, those words didn't come often.

I believe all children feel this way. They want to feel important to us. They want to feel as though they matter and that we are proud of them. My wife, Angela, pointed out to me the other day that anytime our son, Jacob, does anything, the first person he looks at is me. He wants to know that I saw it. He desires my attention and my affirmation. So often, though, we are too busy looking down at our phones and being caught up in the rat race of life to see this. We develop a mentality that our kids should know how we feel about them because of all the work we put in on their behalf. That's how we deal with not sharing our time and words of affirmation with them. We tell ourselves our actions should speak for themselves.

Men, that isn't good enough. Our kids need us to be active and present in their lives. They need us to be generous with our time, even when we don't think we have it to give. The most important thing we can ever do is to be a great father to our children. God gave us that responsibility as fathers. We need to be a St. Joseph to our own kids. We need to spend more time taking interest in things that interest them. We need to participate in the lives of our children with our eyes wide open and mouths full of encouraging words. If we are not preaching to our children their worth and their dignity you can sure bet that the world will be preaching a different message to them.

The best way we can convey our love to our children is through our generosity. Our generosity with our words and with our time. Buying things for your children will never replace quality time with them. Words of affirmation from somewhere else will never have the impact of the affirmation from a father. Brothers, let's stop talking about being good fathers, and actually do it! If you are an older man with children who are now grown and out on their own, then still be a good father. If you and your children are still alive and breathing, you have time to be a good father. Let's be intentional moving forward about generosity with our children. Work will always be there. The yard can be mowed later. Take advantage of every second you have with your kids. Make sure that their memories of you are full of your time and your generous words.

By now, you are probably thinking, "Ok, John, this is getting unoriginal." Hahaha. The thing is, there is no secret game plan to being generous. Our generosity needs to be conveyed through our time, talents, and treasure. This is no different when it comes to our neighbors.

We live in a world where people are growing more and more hostile to each other. People are constantly tearing each other down and using hateful words to describe each other. The world is trying to make us believe that everybody is racist and that we should all hate each other. This is just flat out wrong. Jesus told us to love our neighbor as ourselves. As a King He came to serve, and it can be no different for us. There are people hurting all around us and they are in dire need of our generosity. They need us to be generous with the gift of our finances. As Americans we spend money on so many of our whims each and every day and then claim we have nothing left over to give. We constantly drive past the homeless and allow them to fend for themselves. We need to open our hearts and allow charity to flow through our acts of generosity. We need to start greeting people with kindness again. We need to hold doors for people and learn to be generous with our smiles and our greetings. We need to lift people up instead of tearing them down. How about the next time we cross paths with a homeless person, we give them the benefit of the doubt and help them instead of thinking the worst of them? How about the next time we disagree with someone, we meet them with kind, respectful words and understanding? It is easy to be generous with hate and criticism. It takes real virtue to be generous with the opposite.

In this final week of the month, let's really put into practice the virtue of generosity. Let's actively look for ways in which we can serve others with our time, talent and treasure. There are opportunities to serve others all around you. Take a look at how you have been blessed lately and see how much of that blessing you can share with others. Maybe it's kind words because you have been blessed to receive them lately. Maybe it's giving more in a tithe at church or giving a little more to the homeless guy in the street from the bonus check you just received. It could be picking up a shift in the soup kitchen for the first time in your life or helping a friend with a project. Whatever the case may be, open your eyes this week to all the opportunities God places in front of you to be generous with your neighbor. I think you'll be amazed at what you find.


